THE CRISIS OF GLOBALISATION

9-11 November 2017, Berlin

featuring **introductory lectures** on heterodox economics for graduate students on **9 November 2016**

The market-radical regime of globalization started to unfold in the 1970s. Since then, integration of financial markets and global value chains have grown to unprecedented levels. Multinational companies and financial institutions have gained substantial power. Globalization produced winners, but also many losers. Contrary to expectations, many countries have experienced low GDP growth, accompanied by financial booms-bust cycles and high unemployment. Inequality within countries and between developed and poor countries increased, with only a small number of developing countries catching up. Right-wing parties are on the rise and hit long-standing left anti-globalization movements. All this seems to indicate that the present type of globalization is economically and politically exhausted. At our 21st conference, we will assess how the past globalization process can be explained, in which direction it may develop, and which policies are needed to make the global economy beneficial for all.

The **submission of papers in the following areas** is particularly encouraged:

- Developments of globalisation over the last 40 years and/or future developments
- The global financial system
- Multinational companies, global production networks and domestic policies
- Globalization and inequality between and within countries
- Globalization and migration
- Globalisation and functional income distribution
- Globalization and ecological challenges
- Alternatives to the present model of globalisation

For the open part of the conference submissions on the general subject of the Forum for Macroeconomics and Macroeconomic Policies are encouraged as well. We particularly welcome submissions of papers for **graduate student sessions**. Graduate students who already presented a paper in previous FMM conferences shall submit to the regular sessions to improve chances for newcomers. There will also be a day of **introductory lectures** for graduate students prior to the opening panel on 9 November. Hotel costs will be covered for graduate student presenters (max. four nights from 8 to 12 November).

Proposals have to be submitted electronically via [this web application](#). The deadline for paper proposals (abstract of max. 400 words) is **15 July 2017**. Proposals for organized sessions with abstracts of three or four papers are welcome and can also be submitted through the web application. **Decisions** will be made in early August and **will be based on clarity, relevance and originality of abstracts** outlining the research question, method and (preliminary) results. In case of acceptance, full papers, including an abstract of max. 200 words are due by **15 October** and will be posted on [the conference web page](#). Selected papers will be published after the conference in a special Papers & Proceedings issue of the European Journal of Economics and Economic Policies: Intervention (EJEEP). The conference language is English.

Registration details for the conference and the introductory lectures will be available via [the conference web page](#) by **mid-August**. Please note that acceptance to present a paper does not imply automatic registration.
